Resolution To Amend Articles Of Incorporation To Be Voted Upon On March 21, 1968

The Internal Revenue Service recently informed LAS PALMAS MASONIC BUILDING ASSOCIATION that they were considering the Association's Application for Exemption from Federal income tax under Section 501 (c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code, and in order to retain the Association's exempt status it would be necessary to amend the Articles of Incorporation by adding the following paragraph:

"NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Articles of Incorporation of LAS PALMAS MASONIC BUILDING ASSOCIATION be amended in this respect:

That there be added an additional paragraph numbered EIGHTH, reading as follows:

"That this corporation is organized for the exclusive purpose of holding title to property, collecting income therefrom, and turning over the entire amount less expenses, to Las Palmas Lodge No. 366 Free and Accepted Masons of the State of California."

The resolution was adopted by the Board of Directors at the meeting of the Building Association on February 13, 1968, and the Secretary was directed to deliver a copy to W. PRICE ROBINSON, Secretary of LAS PALMAS, to be presented to the Lodge at its stated meeting on February 15, 1968.

On that date the resolution was presented to the Lodge to be voted upon at the stated meeting of LAS PALMAS on March 21, 1968, and the Secretary of the Lodge was instructed to print the foregoing resolution as passed by the Building Association and presented to LAS PALMAS LODGE in the LAS PALMIAN FRATERNAL ORGAN of LAS PALMAS LODGE prior to said meeting.

EDITORIAL (INVESTIGATING)

When the Master sends you that all important little sheet asking you to investigate the desirability of admitting an applicant into our lodge, a fearsome responsibility devolves upon you. A little chunk of the future of Las Palmas Lodge rests upon your diligence. The whole is in a very real sense the sum of its component parts. A Masonic lodge is not a reformatory. It seeks to admit good men and make them better. Conditions here are not like those in a small town where one knows almost everyone else. In a city our size hardly any applicant is known by even a handful of the brethren. When a member approaches the altar to ballot, he must base his decision upon your recommendation.

The primary sins of investigating committees are procrastination and consequent sloppiness. Each Master, as the stated meeting approaches, must call committeemen for a report or put the ballot off for a month. The committeeman pleads that he has been too busy and patches together a hasty report, often without adequate investigation. Start as soon as the request comes to you and dig hard. Call all four recommenders and sponsors. Don't just ask them whether so-and-so is O. K., but ask a prepared list of specific questions to probe his character and habits.

Check the applicant's financial responsibility. We have enough lodge members of the Merchants' Association that you can get a credit rating. Find out whether there has been a bankruptcy in the background.

Several high-ranking police officals are Masons and can find out if there is any criminal record involved.

Find out about the applicant's health. Artificial limbs are out and a candidate may not wear a hearing aid for the degrees.

Family attitudes are important. Men whose wives are not in sympathy with Masonry do not attend lodge. Arrange to see the wife privately and sound out whether she heartily approves. The opposition of two or three religious sects has sidelined some men who have gotten in, and we have even lost members because of church opposition.

Be especially careful to probe motives. Does the applicant hope to use the lodge to further his business; promote his political aspirations does he think the heart of Masonry lies in the appendant bodies and the Blue Lodge is just a necessary step to achieve his goals? If an older man without secure income, is the Masonic Home a glint in his eye?

If you have a sincere doubt, your decision should be for the welfare of the lodge, not sympathy for the applicant. The caliber of lodge rests more on the quality rather than the quantity of its members.

You're not likely to be called on for this vital role more than once in two to five years. When your time comes, do a workman-like job!
