Why, Where and How of AF & AM and F & AM

The question has popped up again, for the "umpteenth" time. It was after the Lay-man's Night Program. Several of the Brethren asked. It has been answered before, guess it didn't sink in. The question is on course, "why is there AF & AM and F & AM?

First let's set the stage for an extremely important period in masonic history. In 1751, the Premier Grand Lodge, formed in 1717, was begining to be criticized, ridiculed and severely blamed for adulterating masonic traditions and altering the proper conduct of the work according to the old traditions. It is true the Premier Grand Lodge did make some changes. Some of the first degree became part of the second, and part of the second became part of the first. Words and signs were also shifted. They were also of the opinion that the Holy Royal Arch should not be a part of the third degree. In defense of these changes it should be said that they were made as a result of the many exposures published at that time, particularly Pritchards' Masonry Dissected. These exposures made it quite easy for nonmasons to gain admission into regular lodges.

The movement begun principally by Irish masons and strongly supported by Laurence Dremott, became so strong that in 1751 a new Grand Lodge was formed and assumed the name Antient Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons according to the old traditions. This new group called themselves the Antient Grand Lodge and refered to the Premier Grand Lodge as the Moderns. Notice that the initials forming the new Grand Lodges name are AF & AM. Those of the Moderns remained F & AM.

During this peiod of confusion and unrest many charters were issued by both Grand Lodges throughout the world. Those granted by the Antients were known as the Ancient Free and Accepted Masonic Lodges and those by the Moderns Free and Accepted Masonic Lodges. Actually the substance of the work, its meaning and the desired result are very similar. The aims of both did not change.

In 1813 the two Grand Jurisdictions combined. Up to that time many charters had been issued here in the States. It is interesting to note that at the present time in this country there are four Juridictional titles. There are 25 under the title F&AM, 22 under AF&AM, one FAAM in the District of Columbia and one AFM in South Carolina. The last two chosen at the time of their formation and influenced by the position taken by the Antients regarding the "Old Traditions." The present title of the English Grand Lodge as decided in 1813 is, The United Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of England.
